



Annual Report 2023-24

About the organisation:

The name "SEED" stands for Social Education for Environment and Development, an organisation formed in 1991 when a group of development practitioners and social activists witnessed the plight of the people of Malkangiri. These founders joined to create a platform that would enable a unified approach towards development. SEED is a secular, non-profit and non-political organization that supports the impoverished and marginalised scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, and other socio-economic weaker sections. SEED is managed by experienced development professionals who have years of work experience in tribal locations. Along with retaining experienced professionals, the organisation has engaged young, energetic community members whose first-hand knowledge of tribal issues provides them with countless novel ideas. The organization focuses on themes of education, livelihood, environmental protection, women empowerment, and building the health and capacity of tribal particularly vulnerable groups.

The organisation is registered under the following legal provisions.

- Registered under Indian Societies Registration Act XXI of 1960.
- Foreign Contribution Regulation Act (FCRA) in 2005 bearing FC registration no 105090006.
- Income Tax act 12A and 80G.

Our Vision

Building a society of the most vulnerable groups that is physically healthy, economically self-reliant, ecologically sustainable and socially active having control over existing and available resources that leads to a quality of life.

Our Mission:

- To work for the empowerment of tribal women and children.
- To provide primary education to tribal girls.
- To organise rural poor for their own development.
- Break the circle of poverty and dependency.
- Work for the basic health care and eye care of the community
- Reducing IMR, MMR and enhancing quality of life
- Rehabilitation of disabled people.

Approaches:

SEED believes that communities possess an inherent power that enables them to break the chain of poverty and disadvantages surrounding them. Communities can accomplish this by creating an environment in which the community can gain access to and control over their common resources like land, water, forest, development schemes, credit/capitals etc. SEED treats each and every tribal set as a microcosmic unit, distinguished by distinct lifestyles and cultures. The different features of each tribal community make it necessary to develop a context-specific approach to its development. SEED also employs a holistic approach when addressing tribal problems. Instead of providing a quick fix to the problem, SEED strives to create long-term sustainable solutions. By requiring the participation of community members and creating self-sustaining processes, the organizations that result are independent and able to survive without external support for years to come. Capacity and skill building ensures active participation of communities in their own developmental planning as well as execution. Community participation helps to create community ownership and leads to sustained result.

Operational area:

SEED operates in the Malkanagiri district of Odisha. This district was previously part of the Koraput district but due to reorganization, it was segregated into a separate district in the year 1992. Most parts of the district are covered with dense, inaccessible forests, small but beautiful rivers, undulating plateaus, and filled with splendorous rich tribal culture. Because of its inaccessibility and shared border with two extremism prone states (Chhattisgarh and Andhra Pradesh) the people often encounter violence and death due to Naxal activities. All development measures have been crippled here due to its distance from the state capital and the population that is predominantly primitive tribal communities of Bonda, Koya, Paraja and Bengali refugees. The high prevalence of poverty, malnutrition, migration, and land alienation has forced tribes here to live on very limited resources. Further, the encroachment and penetration of people from outside has strained the tribal ecosystem and the social fabric to its limits. This is because the tribal culture has continued to be silently pushed around by other cultures. Although the region is rich in natural resources, most of the raw materials are used in the primary sector, minimizing the return. The jungles and vast stretches of agricultural land are still used in a very primitive manner.

In this operational area SEED tries to intervene on certain key issues, bringing solutions to the social issues that plague these people. One example is the presence of middlemen in every cycle of production from agricultural to industrial, which has even further reduced profit margins for locals. This decreased profit, combined with decreasing agricultural productivity, has forced many individuals to migrate.

Noting the difficult situation in the area, SEED started working in the Malkangiri district in 1991. The organization holds as a key concept that empowerment can only take place when

women are uplifted through education. Education is the only way to free them from the dependent state they are currently in. Accordingly, SEED set out to provide this education through a residential education program for tribal girls.

Education in the region faces several problems. First, the existing education system in the region is non-tribal in context, culture and symbol. This causes many tribal girls to shy away from education. Another hurdle is reluctant parents that females are worthy of receiving an education at all. Many parents would prefer their daughters to be engaged as babysitters at home so that the parents can leave home to earn wages. Finally, due to extreme poverty, many in the region struggle to obtain stationeries and the nutritious food needed for long days at school.

After considering these challenges, SEED devised an educational model to overcome them all. First, the school would be a context-specific and culturally appropriate environment for tribal girls. Secondly, the school would provide free lodging, boarding, stationary, learning materials and nutritious food, eliminating all financial barriers. Finally, SEED engaged the parents in counseling, telling them about the value of education to their daughters, their family, and their community. After continued counseling, the parents were finally convinced to send girls to the center to receive an education. In 1998, the school, SEED Kanyashram, was born.

Today, SEED Kanyashram continues to deliver context-specific and culturally appropriate primary education to tribal girls in the Malkanagiri District. The School embodies our core belief that educating women can solve many of society's problems in a sustainable manner. The enrollment at the school continues to increase, with 190 girls attending the school the previous year. Through the gracious aid of our supporters, we are able to continue uplifting these girls and this community through education.

Educational Complex for Tribal girls:

The Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Government of India is supporting SEED in implementing this residential educational complex running exclusively for tribal girls. The complex, named SEED Kanyashram, has a special focus on all round development of girls through literacy. Yoga, sports, drawing, song, dance, debate competition and many more useful events have been included in the daily routine in order to identify and flourish the existing inner talents of the students. The Kanyashram being legally established in 1998 is situated at Tandapalli village of Korukonda block, Malkangiri district, Odisha. Currently, 190 tribal girls are being provided with primary education up to class VII.



Excellence in education and fostering the love of learning is the hallmark of “SEED”. The following activities were conducted for the students of SEED Kanyashram during the year 2023-24.

Educational Activities done during this period:

- Campaign for new students enrolment - 46 no students enrolled
- 25 students taken transfer certificate to study in schools near to their area.
- Preparation of syllabus and lesson plan for the academic year 2023-24.
- Supply of uniforms, teaching and learning materials to 190 students.
- Supply food stuff and sundry items to all

students.

- Organized free health and eye check-ups with medicine to all students.
- Observation of national days and celebration of festivals.
- Campus development activities.
- Extra-curricular activities
- Supply special food during festivals and celebrations.
- Renovation of the old hostel building, colouring, and complete of the class room building for classes VI to VII.

Vacation Utilisation: From 21st April 23 to 21st June 2023, the school was closed due to summer vacation. Prior to summer vacation, students were assigned with different home works to complete at home. During the summer vacation, a two-day orientation program organised for teachers, where they prepared syllabus and lesson plans for the new academic year 2023-24. From this year, classes for VII opened in the school and 32 students are continuing in the class. The newly constructed class room and office building in SEED Kanyashram campus are being used for class VI and VII students. Accordingly the total student's strength became 190.

Services/Amenities Provided: Students have received teaching learning materials like books, note sheet, and monthly sundry items like washing powder, bath soap, and oil. Health checks up conducted in the school and medicine also distributed to the needy children. In the case of major illness, they have been referred to the district head quarter hospital for treatment.



Learning by Doing: In the school premise, the students had grown and learned kitchen gardening, vegetable cultivation, papaya plantation, flower garden etc. They have also done fish cultivation in the pond. These are



basically life skill where they learn by self-practicing. Vegetables cultivated by the students are radish, papaya, brinjal, pumpkin, cowpea (jhudanga), beans, bitter gourd and ridge gourd. It was completely chemical free and the students and staffs consumed all the vegetables.

Celebrations and Observations: All local as well as state cultural festivals are observed in the school with the active involvement of the students and school staffs. The intension behind such celebration is let the children not forget their root, let them feel homely; let them understand the importance of their culture and let them enjoy with their traditional dress, food, song and dance. Similarly important state days, national days and international days those are related to their education, to their role as citizen and to influence the life story of great personnel, the school creates environment where the students are engaged in innovative ways to observe, get inspired and build their own future.

During cultural celebrations or festival days, the students wear new dresses, participate in song, dance, drawing, painting competitions and served with delicious food usually prepared at home. Similarly on important days, the students participate in debate, essay writing and sports activities to know the

importance of the day and its usefulness.

School Picnic: Picnics normally release the in-house stress, break stereotypes and bring freshness to life. The annual picnic of the school was organized on 6th Feb, 2024, at a location near to SEED Campus. All students, teaching staffs, non-teaching staffs and local management members participated. Special food and cultural events were organised in this outing program.

Annual Sports: The annual sports is organised in the school premise between 6th Feb and 7th Mar. Various sporting events organised are- 100-meter race, a sac race, biscuits and chocolates races, math race, spoon race, balloon race, high jump, long jump, music chair, shot-put throw, skipping race, puchi competition etc. Winners are selected by judges and they will be awarded with prizes during the school's annual function program. Every Saturday of the week, students practice guided sports events as per their choice and preference. In normal days, students practice various games during off-class time but within the school campus.

Annual Examination: Annual examination conducted from 15th March to 20th March 2024 and 190 students appeared in summative Assessment – (SA-II) examination. Students normally complete a class and pass to upper class. The performance in the final exam is very important as some students apply for



Navodaya and other higher schools for which teaching staffs give extra effort to clear all subjects as well as doubts. We invite the parents for parents meeting and share the results of the students, let the parents know the standard of their children and assess the functioning of the school. Parent's suggestion on the teaching, food and residential arrangements helps us to improve our management.

Swachha Bharat Abhiyan:

On the auspicious occasion of Gandhi Jayanti on 2nd Oct, a rally was held at SEED Kanyashram, all the students and staffs participated in the rally, Padayatra with placard for **Swachha Bharat Abhiyana**. A debate competition was organised to sensitise the students on Gandhian principles.

Renovation and colouring of Old hostel and Class room buildings:-

Considering the need and convenience of the students, renovation, repairing and constructions are done in the school complex. During this period renovation work at the kitchen room, old toilets and old hostel building were completed. Similarly colouring of walls of newly constructed works was done. Necessary electrical wirings, fitting of light, fan, iron door and window completed in the campus. A new gate constructed with a display board. A new school building for classes VI to VIII was constructed for SEED Kanyashram. In addition this the following works also done.

- Replaced the old sports equipments with new one.
- A new piece of land adjacent to the school boundary was taken on lease for the purpose of play ground and the land was leveled and prepared for use.
- Constructed one pacca store room inside of the old hostel.

Visits/Inspections: District, State and National administrative authorities visit our campus at regular intervals and their feedback and observation helps us to upgrade and adopt new systems in management.

- The District Welfare Officer, District Social Welfare Officer & Welfare Extension Officer of Malkanagiri visited SEED Kanyashram on 3rd Nov 2023 and interacted with staffs and students.
- DI of Schools inspected the school on 6th Nov 2023.
- Medical team are visiting the school on every month and conduct health check up and distribute medicines to needy.



- Block Education officer and his team visited on 10 Oct 2023 for the purpose of inspection and recommendation for extension of class from 1st to 8th.

On 10th Oct 2023 Mr Subhasis and his colleague from Azim Premji foundation, Odisha office, Bhubaneswar visited our school and interacted with the students, teaching staffs and take note of the local context and our intervention. The purpose of the visit was to understand the local situation and explore possibilities for future partnership.



Activities on violence against women:

Malkanagiri district is one of the districts in KBK area in Odisha and KBK is famous for starvation and distress migration. The vulnerability of women in an already disadvantaged situation is multi-folded. Women, who constitute half of the population, play an important role towards the society's socio-economic development. They are instrumental in building up a new social order. Despite such a huge involvement, her role and contribution is undermined. Although a lot of laws and rules have been enacted to protect the rights and dignity of women but still a huge gap exist in the society and it's more visible in rural scenario. Due to low literacy and poor information, the benefits of various women development schemes have very little filtered to them. SEED a right based organisation has been working in Malkanagiri since 3 decades to ensure the protection of women, girls, weaker section and child labour.

Campaign on violence against Women: The 16 Days Campaign has been used by individuals and groups around the world to call for the elimination of all forms of violence against women and girls. SEED also observed the 16 days campaign as a unique moment to advocate the women and girls issues at different villages of Korkunda block on such discriminations and their elimination.

International women's Day:

The International Women's Day is observed worldwide on 8th of March every year to acknowledge the contribution of women in every walk of life. It's not just a mere celebration but an inner filling of reciprocating love care equality respect and equal opportunity. Women's day also marks a call for gender equal world that is free of bias, stereotypes and discrimination and diverse, equitable and inclusive which differences are valued and celebrated. The theme of 2024 was 'Inspire Inclusion'. Inspire Inclusion encourages everyone to recognise the unique perspective and contributions of women from all walks of life, including those from marginalised communities. The campaign theme was 'Buy to support women year around'.

On 8 March, all the students and staffs of SEED celebrated International Women's Day. Our celebration was to sensitise everyone on the theme and keep the spirit energised all the time. SEED from its inception has recognised the role of women in the society and always strived for equality, justice, equal opportunity, respect, violence free and discrimination free development approach in its plan program and objective.



Parents Teachers Meeting:

Parents-teachers meeting were organized on quarterly interval to improve the educational atmosphere and the quality of teaching at SEED. This is very important to ensure the school is providing culturally appropriate teaching and quality food and hostel arrangement. The committee also discusses topics such as the status of the school and the performance of the girls. Finally, the committees suggest ideas for the continuation of students' education and ways that parents can participate in the school on different occasions.

Annual inspection:

As per government regulation, a team consisting of the DWO, DI of Schools, and Welfare Extension Officer, Malkangiri and headed by the District Welfare Officer, Malkangiri visited the school and interacted with staffs and students. The inspection team visited the existing hostel, lavatory, dining area, classroom, and kitchen to assess the present status of the school's infrastructure. The team also examined the performance of students and verified school documents and records for their annual inspection report. Overall, the team was satisfied with the existing situation and performance of the school.



Women's Empowerment Programme:

The women's empowerment and livelihood programme is one of the focus activities of SEED. This year, SEED organised a meeting and training session among women's self-help groups and shared with them about social inclusion, economic inclusion, and financial

management for their respective group members. In addition, SEED encouraged women to regularly save financially and take part in different income generating activities. The income generation programmes through these SHGs have-not only allowed women to begin generating income, but have also instilled a sense of confidence among them. SEED has imparted training on reproductive health care, institutional delivery, use of safe drinking water, use of mosquito nets, use of sanitary toilets, and promotion of kitchen gardening through government programs.

Campus development work

SEED raised income and helped feeding students by utilizing the pisciculture project in the pond located behind the old hostel building within the campus. A total of 8 quintals of fishes were harvested from the pond this year and the school children enjoyed their meal. Similarly vegetables and lemons are produced in good quantity within the school campus. Student's consumption gets priority while the surplus is sold.

During the rainy and winter seasons, a variety of green & leafy vegetables like brinjal, cabbage, cauliflower, chili, tomatoes, and pumpkins are cultivated in the small kitchen garden within the campus. A lemon garden has also been developed inside the campus. Seasonal flowers such as Marigold, Jasmine, and Hibiscus are planted to make the campus environment beautiful and attractive.

Solar panels have been installed on top of the hostel building to produce renewable energy and to maintain power when the electricity grid shuts off.



Capacity building training

As teaching the students within a school is important, it is equally important to train and orient the teachers to upgrade their understanding, teaching methodology and other required skills. In this context a three-day training was conducted for staff members from 8/06/2023 to 10/06/2023 on teaching health and hygiene, sanitation, teaching methodology, documentation, care and protection of children, childcare and education, psycho-social development of children, and the maintenance of records and documents.



Sponsorship Program

Under the sponsorship program, SEED Kanyashram (Tandapally) was able to render additional support to tribal girls. The sponsorship program has enabled us to render services to additional 26 students studying in VI & VII. All these students were provided with free health care, learning materials, dress materials, food and other all services provided to our regular students. Sponsorship enabled us to undertake renovation work, purchasing play equipment, renovate part of the hostel, and ensured beautification and regular cleanliness of the school campus. It also aids us to provide special meals to the children during festivals and holidays.

Environment Awareness Campaign:

Environmental pollution caused by use of plastic is one of the burning challenges at the moment. Similarly waste creation and absence of plan for waste management is adding fuel to fire of pollution. With this backdrop, SEED on 5th June the World Environment Day organised

an awareness meeting as well as campaign with the students and teachers to take oath that we will neither use plastic nor promote use of plastic in our daily life. Similarly, the domestic waste would be tried to be reused or handed over to appropriate persons for proper use. All the students and the teachers were sensitised to protect forest and to create forest. A one-day awareness meeting was also organized by SEED at its school premises and a total of 38 participants took part. Participants included women 'self-help groups, PRIs, integrated child development teachers, ASHA workers, youth members, and teachers.

World water day observation:

On 22nd Mar, all the students and teaching staffs observed world water day through organising an awareness meeting. Parents and management committee members were also invited to this meeting. Students were informed earlier to collect information on the subject and prepare for a speech on the subject. The teaching staff also sensitised the members as well as students to save water as the quantity and source of potable water is shrinking day by day. It's time to understand and act to save and best utilise every drop of water and at the same time we must act to prevent water pollution. All the members took oath to save water.



Prevention and restoration of eye sight:

90% of the eye problems are avoidable and curable. Addressing eye related issues at right time ensures normalcy. As SEED is working in a very inaccessible remote forest area and the general health awareness among the people is very less, SEED started conducting eye camps in Malkanagiri as well as Dhenkanal district. Around 200 girl students and 300 senior male female persons screened their eye in Malkanagiri and similarly in Dhenkanal district, 3 nos of eye camps organized for 400 persons belonging to the tribal community, farmers, students and women. Persons with minor issues were treated with medications and persons having vision issue were provided with spectacles at the spot and individuals requiring intensive and expert service were referred to the nearest Govt eye hospital and Kalinga eye hospital. SEED participated actively and extended maximum support in campaigns like blindness control and world sight day. In addition this SEED creating eye cares education about early identification and prevention eye diseases among different school children in Malkanagiri and Dhenkanal district of Odisha. Maximum time referred eye patients to different government and non government eye hospitals for their need based treatment.

Infrastructural Development in SEED School campus

SEED started its residential education program for tribal girls at Tandapalli village of Malkangiri district in the year 1998 with 50 girl students. With the change of time, realisation of parents towards education and finally considering the performance of our school, the number of student's enrolment increased and now it reached 190. Initial infrastructures were created for 50 students and slowly the infrastructure base also expanded. At the beginning the permission for class was till class-V and now the permission extended to

class-VII. Thus, the need to accommodate extra students, SEED is constructed a new school building and renovated the existing hostel building for classroom, office and accommodation of students. In addition to this electrification, installation of solar power system, introduce gas chulas with traditional chulas (fire wood) for hostel, arrange one playground for students , one new kitchen room and pacca room for store constructed inside the old hostel room. Now the old hostel building are fully renovated and well equipped for accommodation of the students.

1. The grant for recognition is not extendable and does not in any way imply any obligation to recognize / affiliate beyond Class-V.
2. The School shall abide by the provisions of Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 and the Odisha Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Rules 2010.
3. The School shall admit in class I, to the extent of 25% of the strength of that class, children belonging to weaker section and disadvantaged group in the neighbourhood and provide free and compulsory elementary education till its completion. Provided, further that in case of pre primary classes also, this norm shall be followed.
4. For the children referred to in paragraph 3, the School shall be reimbursed as per Section 12(2) of the Act. To receive such reimbursements school shall provide a separate bank account.
5. The Society / School shall nor collect any capitation fee and subject the child of his or her parents or guardians to any screening procedure.
6. The School shall not deny admission to any child for lack of age proof. If such admission is sought subsequent to the extended provided prescribed for admission.

On the ground of religion, caste or race, place of birth or any of them.

7. The School shall ensure:
 - (i) No child admitted shall be held back in any class or expelled from school till the completion of elementary education in a school.
 - (ii) No child shall be subjected to physical punishment or mental harassment.
 - (iii) No child is required to pass any board examination till the completion of elementary education.
 - (iv) Every child completing elementary education shall be awarded a certificate as laid down under Rule 22.
 - (v) Inclusion of Students with disabilities / special needs as per provision of the Act.
 - (vi) The teachers are recruited with minimum qualifications as laid under Section 23(1) of the Act.
 - (vii) The teacher performs its duties specified under Section 24(1) of the Act and the teachers shall not engage themselves for private teaching activities.

8. The School shall follow the syllabus on the basis of curriculum laid down by appropriate authority.
9. The School shall enroll students proportionate to the facilities available in the school as prescribed in the Section 19 of the Act.
10. The School shall maintain the standards and norms of the school as specified in Section 19 of the Act. The facilities reported as the time of last inspection are as given under:-
 - Area of school campus
 - Total built-up area
 - Area of play ground
 - No. of Class rooms
 - Room for Headmaster-cum-office-cum-storeroom
 - Separate toilet for boys and girls
 - Drinking Water facility
 - Kitchen for cooking Mid Day Meal
 - Barrier free access
 - Availability of Teaching Learning Material / Play Sport Equipments / Library.
11. No unrecognized classes shall run within the premises of the school or outside in the same name of school.
12. The School buildings or other structures or the grounds are used only for the purposes education and skill development.
13. The School is run by a society registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860(21 of 1860), or a public trust constituted under any law for the time being in force;
14. The School is not run for profit to any individual, group or association of individuals or any other persons;
15. The accounts should be audited and certified by a Chartered Accountant and proper accounts statements should be prepared as per rules. A copy each of the Statements of Accounts should be sent to the DEO every year.
16. The recognition Code Number allotted to your schools is 0162022. This may please be noted and quoted for any correspondence with this office.
17. The School furnishes such reports and information as may be required by the Director, Elementary Education / District Education Officer / Block Education Officer as the case may be from time to time and complies with such instructions of the State Government / Local Authority as may be issued to secure the continued fulfilment of the condition of recognition or the removal of deficiencies in working of the schools;
18. Renewal of Registration of Society if any, be ensured.


